MACHINE APPLIQUE (example sample shown)



Machine appliqué is a great new way to achieve the time honored look of hand appliqué but much quicker. The quilter uses a fusing and invisible thread to create dramatic results. This process is called raw-edge appliqué. Batiks are stimulating for designs as well as reproduction fabrics. Quilters will be able to design a small wall hanging in the class. Fine quality scraps may be used as well as fatt quarters.

YARDAGE: 1 yd off-white or black for background fabric

1 ½ yd for border and binding

Scrap fabrics for flowers, buds, birds, etc (favorite colors) or fatt qrtrs

½ vd green batik for stems and leaves

1 yd backing fabric

Batting: craft-size

Sewing machine in good working order

Rotary cutter

Rotary mat

6" x 12' ruler

Appliqué scissors, very sharp-pointed 4"

Paper and fabric scissors

Thread – Sulky polyester invisible

Needle 70/10

Freezer paper

Elmer's school glue stick- washable

Teflon (appliqué pressing sheet)

Steam a Seam 2 (lite) (package)

Fine tip black marker

Necessary: flannel back tablecloth or flannel back vinyl for design wall
